Their topics will cover the migration routes, land records, and other records of genealogical value. The conference will close Saturday at 4 PM. There will be numerous book vendors, and a computer room where Ohio Chapter members will demonstrate software and bulletin board genealogy.

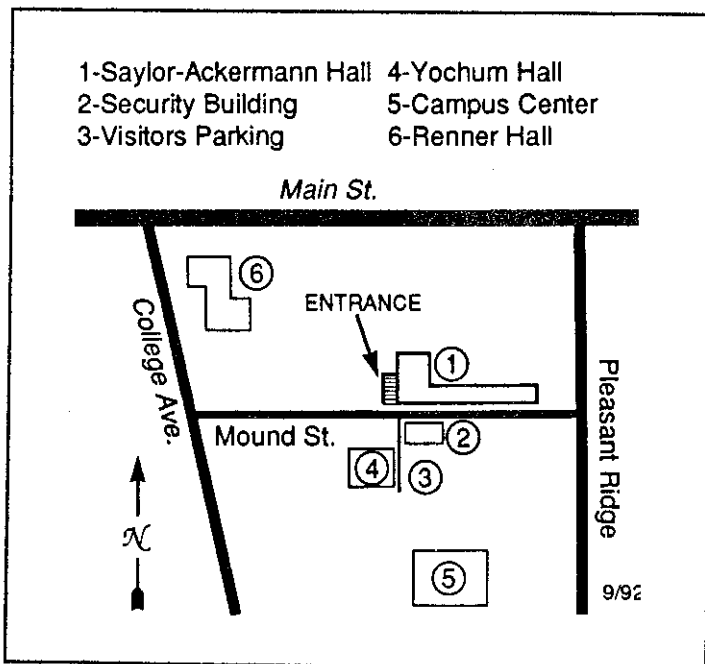

CENTRAL OHIO SATURDAY WORKSHOPS

During the past couple of years, a monthly workshop has evolved in central Ohio. Since September, the group has been meeting once a month at the Grandview Heights Library, 1685 W. 1st Ave on Saturday morning from 9 to 12 noon. Planned by a committee consisting of Jack Quinn, Bob Rudy, and Bob and Clara Harsh, they have been pleased with the response to the programs offered.

On December 19, when the Christmas rush was at its peak, 42 people were present to hear Margaret Dieringer talk about the advent of the various denominations into Ohio, and Clara Harsh give highlights of life in medieval Germany. Coming up on January 23, Arta Johnson will talk about the 30 Years War, and researching in Virginia will be discussed by Jack Quinn, Gene Reynolds, and Clara Harsh.

There will be no meeting in June. The space at Grandview Library is reserved through 1993 for the 3rd Saturday morning of each month. This location is relatively central in Columbus with ample parking.

THE JANUARY WORK SHOP

The Ohio Chapter Central Ohio's first Work Shop for 1993 was attended by 73 persons, a record number. It met at The Grandview Heights Library on Saturday morning of the 23rd. Arta Johnson led off with an hour's discussion of the Thirty Year's War. This is the war that is of particular interest to those having genealogical connections to the migrations from Germany in the 18th century. She spoke of how the Palatinate and other areas of Germany were overrun and devastated by mercenary armies of the French, Swedes and Spanish as well as of The Empire (Austria). Clara Harsh then described with the aid of transparencies, the evolution of the boundaries and names of the counties of Virginia. Gene Reynolds discussed genealogy sources of his native West Virginia. He said the principle resources are at the West Virginia Archives at Charleston and the Library at West Virginia State University at Morgantown. He recounted how in his college days he hitchhiked the 200 miles across

the state from his home on the Ohio River to school at the Potomac State College on the Potomac River. Gene made West Virginia seem like a very interesting state. The final presentation was by Vice-President of the Ohio Chapter, Jack Quinn. He spoke about genealogical resources in Virginia. He passed out a list of libraries in the Shenandoah Valley. He mentioned that the Hessian soldiers who were captured at Trenton in the Revolutionary War were put in a prisoner camp at Winchester Virginia. Many of them became well acquainted with the local residents, married and remained in this country. He reported that the English offered the soldiers 50 pounds if they would settle here, thus relieving them of the cost of returning the men to their homes in Germany.

Several in attendance volunteered their assistance for the National Conference in June. Some, too, offered to help with the Work Shops.

Editor's Ramblings....

We have probably all received mailings for books about "our" families. They are basically a mailing list of persons sharing our surname with a page or two of the origins of the name. Your editor has received several of these and purchased one which proved useful. I knew what I was doing and was not disappointed. Recently the Simonis branch of my family (my original surname) got such letters and inquired of me whether they should buy a copy. An interesting result came from that mailing. A Simonis in Berlin Germany bought "The World Book of Simonis" and wrote to 100 names in the US. I have corresponded with him and have exchanged considerable information on the Simonis family which is most helpful. Of the 100 letters he received one reply other than mine.

The general public is not always satisfied with what they receive. Several have written Joy Wade Moulton.
