#### INTERESTING SPEAKERS!

**Dr. Louis Voigt** is Archivist of Church Records at the Wittenberg University Library. The records are of the English Speaking Lutheran Synods of Ohio which are direct descendants of the eighteenth century German Lutherans of the eastern American Colonies. As the retired librarian of the former Hamma School of Theology at Wittenberg he still receives book collections of retired Lutheran Pastors. With these books he operates the "St. Luke Literature Mission" ( a Lutheran pastor's free book exchange) at 539 W. North St in Springfield. Prior to entering Wittenberg in 1959 he had been an American Infantry soldier in Germany during World War II.

Dr. Voigt has made extensive studies of the life of Martin Luther, a major leader of the Protestant Reformation, and may be considered an expert on that subject.

His presentation will search for the forces work and understanding of the relationships between Lutherans and Reformed immigrants as they worked out in the "Union" Churches of Germany and in the eighteenth century American colonies.

He did war sufferers relief work in Germany after World War II under the auspices of the Mennonite Central Committee. He has also served as Librarian of the Bluffton College Library and the Mennonite Historical Library at Bluffton College. He directs the annual. Swiss Mennonite Heritage Tour to Switzerland, eastern France and southern Germany going to places of interest to the tour members. At present he also lectures at historical and genealogical society meetings on topics relating to Swiss as well as Mennonite history. He also does a limited amount of work on the history and genealogy of Swiss families.

## BACKWARD FOOTPRINTS

Lila Kobs Hubbard

Family Genealogist & Research Historian

Recall the story of the Tortoise & the Hare? Slow steady progress in genealogy is a must when trying to locate or trace the movement of immigrant ancestors. Genealogy is a science and should be approached from a scientific and historical approach. Someone recently described genealogy as a huge jigsaw puzzle. This is true, gathering bits of information piece by piece seems unproductive until the pieces start to fit together. When a picture begins to emerge it is possible by carefully planned research to seek information to fill in the missing pieces.

All avenues of research in the United States should be exhausted before a genealogist tries to trace the family line to its place of origin. This approach may seem like drudgery & it may seem boring even appear to be unrewarding! Who said it would be easy? No one, I know. There is an old saying, "A job worth doing is worth doing well." These

suggestions are not to lighten your burden but more to direct & suggest advantageous routes for successful research. Valuable only if you keep very accurate records of your research. The search is on so start with you & your family. Relatives may think they know nothing but some of them really do! Family stories, documents, membership applications, old letters, etc. may give you a lot of small pieces to your family puzzle.

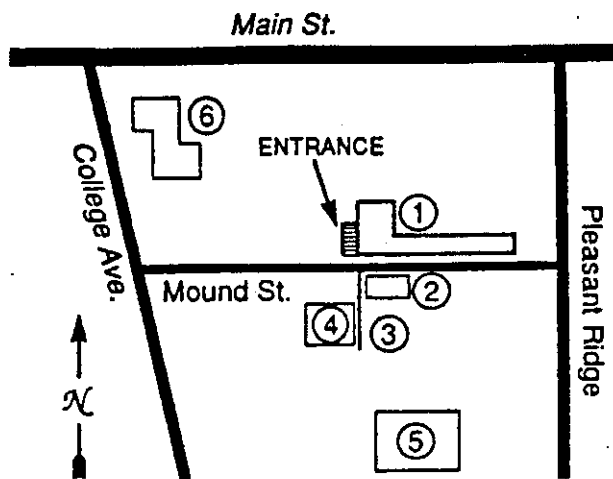
