### Hop Skip and Jump

Jumping generations to hook up with someone who could be your ancestor can lead you into dangerous waters.

Did you know most of our ancestors moved up to six times during their lifetime? Taking a wrong turn could end up causing you to lose many hours of useless research time and take you into a dead end.

Do it right the first time! Begin with known facts that have been verified, then begin working back.

Things to look for: marriage records of parents, grandparents and the childrens marriage records. Property Deeds, WARNING, just don't concentrate on the county but also the township of the property. Remember, they moved around a lot! Look for juries, court cases and tax records, wills and always reliable newspapers. The Germans reported everything in their newspapers. Don't forget to report the in-laws surnames. They can be almost as important as your surname.

I can attest to this personally. I just located a branch of my family tree written by an in-law in 1894. I found two generations of my great grandmother and her grandmothers family tree all the way back to 1199 and everything is authenticated, the author was ahead of his time. So, in-laws can be very important people.

Don't forget to check all those names in the libraries for these possible finds.

## Reasons for Coming to America

From the diary of Philip Jacob Maurer, during the sea voyage to America in 1833.

The thought came to me early in the month of October 1832 that I should go to America with my children. From the moment that I resolved to go I became happy and carefree. It seemed as though that I was transformed. At work and in marching I was never tired. I could make a two-hour march in one and a half hours. Thank God for the wonderful gift of health and for a light and happy heart. The conditions that influenced me to go to America are as follows:

1. The bad housekeeping of the State where the expenses are so great, and the princely household, the officers and the state officials are paid too high also the customs and the toll. The land is cut into small parts so no one gets into a new land with each day's journey, and each land is encircled by a toll line. Commerce is hindered. The last cent is taken away from the common people. Also the money must be changed and the people are again the losers.

2. Of complimenting and politeness and saluting there is no end. One hardly knows how to frame his sentences so as not to offend. Everyone wants to be addressed as THOU.

3. In the field and in the home one is robbed. One cannot be careful enough.

4. Poverty is so universal that one has to hand out 10 to 15 pounds of bread daily. Among these are many beggars. One knows them but dares not to refuse them, because of what they may do. They live in the next village and are very dangerous.

5. One cannot be too careful in the lending of money and grain. One is cheated often. There is no such thing as keeping one's word among the people. When people need money or other things they give you angel words (Engleworte) but if you ask them in return what they borrowed, they become your enemies and call you heartless. The returning of things is hard because they are so needy. Many times one loses. All confidence is gone and one dreads to help anyone, but still one has no peace from the borrower.

6. The Sabbath is desecrated. The good and upright person has to battle to stay in the straight and narrow path.

7. In spite of the extraordinary taxes, the State debt gets higher and higher every year. What will things come to when it must be paid? According to the speakers at the Hambacher Festival, the State debt amounted to 124 million florin on the 27 of May 1832.

8. The military duty is worrying me because of my five sons.

9. Friendship is seldom found. Greed and selfishness have taken the place of true friendship.

10. When it is necessary to go to the law, there is so much expense that many a one loses his right.

11. When one buys land for 100 Fr. the State 14 Fr. and 14 crowns.

12. In the several states of Europe one is robbed of all freedom. A chain is thrown around the people and they are led like animals. For instance, one may not take a dog to the field with him without a fine of 5 Fr. One may not catch a rabbit, for the fine is 3 Fr. Because of these things and many others, I am leaving Europe. For these reasons, wealthy, prominent, and worthy men also officials and spiritual leaders, who are dissatisfied, resolved to migrate to the United States of America, where there is freedom.

## Passing Remarks

Just recently I attended a reunion with the cavalry regiment that I served with during WWII. It came to me in discussing the many war stories about military life that this was a source of information for the genealogist. Not only about dates and locations where an individual served. But, a more in depth research of the good and bad times of the persons military service.

A place to get information is from the local military service organizations in your area. The American Legion, VFW, Disabled Vets, Vietnam Vets and etc. I am sure there is a person on their staff that can give you proper instructions of how to get information on the individual.

Where else do you get information? 1. You can get information from the military discharge papers. On the back it will tell you the dates of service. The training of the person. The campaign ribbons earned. The dates of any actions' he or she was in, decorations earned. Almost anything you would want to know about the person that served in the military. On the front it will tell you the unit the person served. But the most important aspect is to be able to put "flesh on the info" For that type of information get first hand information from the men the person served with.

Most counties have a listing of the discharges in their records. Some states have recorded records of payment compensations applied for, or write National Personnel Records Center, 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis MO 63132. or call 800-827-1000 for assistance. Once you have found out the unit. Look in military magazines for dates of different reunions. You can either attend or write to the person in charge to get first-hand knowledge.

Many service personnel did not receive the medals that they earned during their military service. Write to the same address as above include "Entitlement to Awards Division."

## Palatine Library News

Librarian Ann Miller Scott has some exciting news. Over the summer the library received two substantial gifts. The first was the donation of the large personal library of former Pal-Am speaker, member and Ohio Chapter President Dr. Geart B. Droege (his obituary appeared in the August 1997 Heritage). This collection, which promises to at least double the size our library's holdings, was the gift of three European institutes--Nordfriisk Institut of Bredstedt, Germany; the Fryske Akademy of Ljouwert in The Netherlands; and K.F.V. of Waregem, Belgium. We are extremely grateful to these archives for their generous gift. Many thanks go out as well to Pal-Am President Beth Kroehler and Dr. Droege's estate planner and former Pal-Am member, Philip R. Beltz, for the many hours they spent in correspondence with the institutes and in making arrangements to house this massive collection in climate-controlled, secure off-site temporary storage.

In midsummer, the second gift arrived as a wonderful surprise. One of our longtime members, Dr. William G. Everett of Pittsburgh, sent us a check for \$2,500.00 to use as needed. Dr. Everett had visited our library in June and explained that he was delighted with our resources and the progress he subsequently has made with his many German lines. Clearly, Dr. Everett's gift is especially fortuitous at this time, as we find ourselves seriously in need of new shelving and additional space to house the Droege collection and other recent.

Visitors to our library this fall will discover that we have another reason to celebrate. Our library has two brand-new computers, and one is in the public area of the library for the full-time use of our patrons. We urge our patrons and members to come in and try out some of our CD-ROMs which include German postal code/ fax/ telephone books; USA telephone books; indices of the publications of Picton Press; early Ohio marriage records; and the 1880 Ohio Census index to name just a few.

Ann also would like to add more names to the 1997-98 list of volunteers who have served our library in some manner. First, we are grateful to Marge Kroehler for negotiating on the library's behalf with other genealogical societies to exchange periodical subscriptions. We would also like to thank Jim Amaral for selecting and installing the library's two marvelous new computers. Finally, we thank the following individuals for assisting with the inventorying, sorting and storing of the several thousand books in the Geart Droege Collection during the summer of 1998: Beth, Marge and Ralph Kroehler; Jean Hall; John Mangus; Merle Fox; and Frances and Ken Mercer. We would also like to thank Frances Mercer and her committee for their continuing to explore our options for expanding the library's quarters to house the large donations of materials now in storage.

Surely there are leftover ancestors somewhere who have been neglected despite having been compulsive record-keepers - who left reams of diaries, Bibles, deeds, wills, etc. These poor neglected chaps would be delighted, I'm sure, to be incorporated into some nice moden-day pedigree. Why struggle with lackadaisical ancestors who obviously didn't care a fig about us, when perfectly respectable, highly annotated ancestors are being wasted? Wasted!

We see evidence of these well behaved, but underutilized ancestors all over the place. They show up as the legible name on the census record, right above the faded smudge we suspect might be great-great-grandpa. The sibling whose every life achievement was recorded in minute detail - in still vivid black ink while his younger brother (the "birth ancestor" nature unfortunately assigned us) barely made it into the margin of the family Bible in No. 3 pencil, . Etc., Etc. So, let's give ourselves permission to select the ancestors we truly deserve.

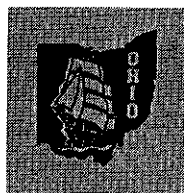
