

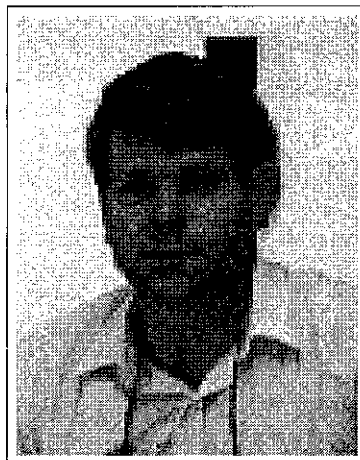

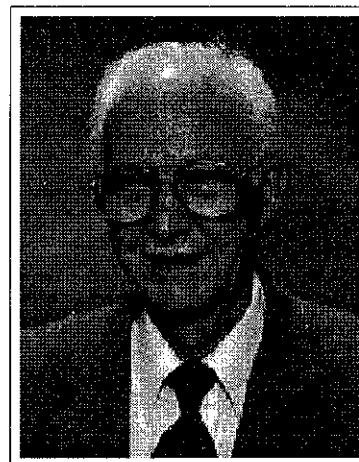

Create An E-mail Family/Surname Newsletter

An online newsletter costs virtually nothing to mail. It can reach hundreds of family members almost immediately and it is easy to create.

Decide if you want a surname newsletter or a family newsletter. A surname newsletter would be sent to any interested individuals with E-mail addresses who have a particular surname in their family tree in common with you. You might also include variations of the spelling.

Ask two or three others know what you are going to do. Ask if they would be interested in helping with the project. Put together a brief history or family story.

Gather facts of your own. Share your own family stories or stories about the surname. Keep a goal in mind and let everyone involved know that goal in the newsletter. Try to keep it as simple as possible.

Find E-mail addresses from the Internet. Write and ask if they are interested in family history or origins. Ask them if they want to be placed on the list, at NO CHARGE. Remember, to let them know they can leave at any time.

Decide how often the newsletter will be sent. Monthly. Bimonthly. Quarterly.

Remember, even if there is no new news keep to your goal and send a hello.

Type out your first issue. Make it easy to read.

What regular items will you want to send out? Some examples, letter to an editor, a family tree each month, famous people bearing your surname, reunion news, recipes. These are just a few of the items that can go out. Of course you don't want to forget to put in the latest queries and findings on research.

Use a separate screen name or E-mail address. Be ready to get feedback and suggestions.

Always be on the lookout for new subscribers and interesting news. GOOD LUCK!

Interested in Learning German

There are a number of web sites out there for German instruction. One of the most user-friendly and offering a tremendous wealth of resources try <http://rivendel.com/-ric/resources/trex.html>. At this website you can explore numerous dictionaries, translators etc. Scroll down to the middle of the page to "German for Beginners" and click on <http://castle.uvic.ca/german/149/>

You will see the heading "What do you say when you meet someone?" Simply click and you can hear the simple phrases spoken in German. At the bottom of the page you see:

LINKS DICTIONARIES GUESTBOOK HELP

An example, select and click on DICTIONARIES that will take you to the page headed DICTIONARIES

Finally try and select the first option: "Deutsch<->Englisch Wörterbuch"

You can type in either a German or English word and it will automatically translate to the other language offering numerous contextual examples of how that word may be used.

Passing Remarks

As a "Passing Remark" it is perhaps hard to imagine but there was a time when celebrations revolved around your hometown. Holidays meant that getting off work. It was a time to celebrate.

Take Memorial Day, when I was young, the celebration began as families and veterans' groups went to every cemetery in town and a flag was placed on every dead



hero's grave. Looking at all the flags in the graveyard taught me to take pride in these men and to revere the men and women who died to protect us and our freedom. After the cemeteries were decorated, a parade would march down the main streets of our town. You could stand on the side of the street and watch Old Glory, or as others call it the star-spangled Banner pass by waving proudly in the breeze.

After the parade many of the townfolk would gather at the cemeteries and listen to the city officials with their patriotic speeches in recognition of the veterans. Many of our younger generation would not believe it, but it doesn't seem too long ago that Civil War veterans marched in the same parade as the World War I veterans. Now we see very little of the World War I veteran and the Civil War veterans are long gone. Those ranks have slowly disappeared. We now see a dwindling of World War II veterans and some Viet Nam veterans.

Later on in the afternoon, the day would be taken up with the whole family getting together on a family picnic. Everyone would bring their own picnic basket. The men would play horseshoes the women would play cards, and us kids would satisfy ourselves with all kinds of games including baseball.

Today, Memorial Day has been reduced to another reason for a three-day weekend. There is not the kind of family and community holiday that it once was. Memorial Day was the kind of holiday that pulled us together as a family, as a community with national pride. How I miss those hometown celebrations.

MOVING

Don't forget to send in your change of address to the National Office



Here are some helpful hints on how to have a great reunion. By this time you will have found a place to hold the reunion, picked

a date and time. Gotten a committee together to help with the planning. Then..... **3 Months in Advance:** Send out post cards to all on your list so they will have time to plan for the date and respond. You don't have to relay all the details until the next letter or postcard. The date, time and place, and a name and phone number are vital. It would also be a good time to send a family sheet for the latest information to add to the family tree.

Contact the manager or owner of the reunion site. Arrange to tour it and have a written list of questions ready to ask concerning use, costs, etc. Take someone with you in case there is a problem or misunderstanding later on and it won't be your word against the managers. **GET IT IN WRITING** Be sure the date is firm if everything looks good.

Discuss with your committee ideas about activities. T-shirts, group photos and other possibilities. Browse through reunion magazines or get books from the library for ideas.

What about a family recipe book? Each family can be asked to send their favorite recipes.

See what is available in the area and contact a photographer, vendors, get price quotes.

Solicit help in finding lost relatives.

2 Months in Advance: Set a budget, and keep track of expenses.

Begin putting together a reunion newsletter that details your activities and schedule. Make final decisions as to activities. Example: swimming, if so lifeguards? will there be alcohol, will lodging be needed, is the reunion lasting more than one day. All these bills of items need to be considered and printed up for the guests.

Contact family members with special talents. Let them know you appreciate them and ask them for assistance in their special areas.

If you sent out family sheets and they have come back turn them over to the family member who is doing the updates.

4 to 6 Weeks in Advance: Firm up all plans. Check to see if the T-shirts will be ready.

Send out the family newsletter; be sure to include a map or directions to the site.

Meet with the committee to be sure there are no problems that need to be ironed out.

Planning A Family Reunion

What is everyone going to eat? Meet with your committee on suggestions for the menu, (remember your budget).

2 to 3 Weeks in Advance: Find out if anyone is coming by plane. Will they need someone to pick them up at the airport? Treat them like family, don't expect them to rent a car or take a cab.

Make sure you have a list of people coming. Will anyone need handicap access? You might want to think about name tags.

Check on hotel rooms and other items you have ordered in advance. Don't assume everything is going okay.

Be sure the family member working on the family tree is ready for final drafts to be handed out at the reunion.

Have a back up plan for extra food, extra games, if it rains, if there is an accident.

If your budget allows send out a reminder postcard. Let them know you are anxious to see everyone.

Week of the reunion: Finalize all details with your committee. Be prepared to pay those bills on time.

Begin making your signs or have a printer make them up. Don't wait till the last minute.

Get in touch with those family members you have as to provide special entertainment.

Are they doing this for free? Make sure they are still coming and still going to do their thing.

Are you ready to go? Do you have film, clothes, equipment etc. food purchased or the caterer has been contacted and is clear on the menu.

Get a first aid kit together, especially if it is going to be out of doors.

Make sure everyone on the committee understands their duties and where all the activities will be taking place at the site.

Then sit back and have a great time.

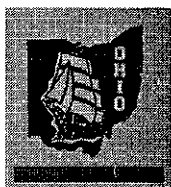
Memorial Fund
