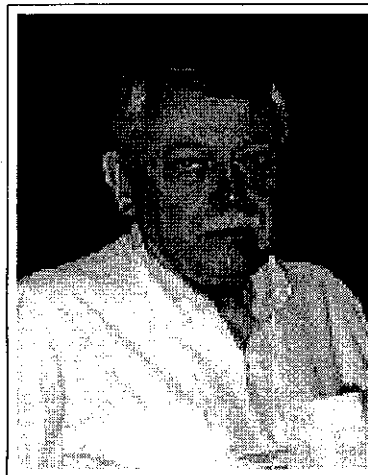

Memorial Service for Dr. Terry Golden



All members join in mourning the passing of Terry Golden Editor of "The Palatine Immigrant" for eighteen years. We hope to build on the foundation that he has established.

Dr. John T. Golden, of Columbus, Ohio, formally of Howell, Michigan, age 68, died Friday, November 10, 2000 at Vencor Hospital in Lincoln

Park, Michigan. He was born January 31, 1932 in Fort Wayne, Indiana, the son of Thomas F. and Mary E. (Jaquay) Golden. He was a graduate of Howell High School, University of Michigan and received his doctorate in Chemical Engineering from Ohio State University. He was a member of the Columbus Germania Club, the Shamrock Club, and the Palatines to America, as well as several technical and societies. He was a thirty-six-year associate of Renite Company and pioneered the development of many high-temperature lubricants as well as authoring several scientific papers on the subject that were published worldwide. He was one of the country's foremost tribologists. Dr. Golden, traveled extensively, including regular trips to Germany and Ireland.

On January 27th a Memorial Service was commemorated at the Germania Club, in Columbus for the late Dr. John T. Golden. Robert Rudy, Past President of the Pal-Am Ohio Chapter, presented a eulogy for Terry. Since Terry, was a singer in the choir for many years The Germania Club Choir, sang several inspirational songs in memory of Terry and a few old German drinking songs. Jim Motika, Vice President of the Germania Club, served as Master of Ceremonies. Included were friends of his from the Shamrock Club and associates from Ohio State University. They relived many stories of his activities much to the amusement of all present. After the service the Germania Club, had a large luncheon and drinks for all present.

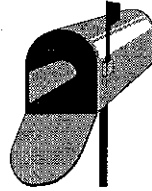

In the Mailbox



Hello, I'm one of the researchers at the Pal-Am Library and read your article in the "Palatine Heritage," August, 2000. I wanted to share with you another way to use the website to research for ancestors in nearby towns.

Using the Columbus metropolitan area as an example: There are several zipcodes in the Columbus Metropolitan area, most of them beginning with the three digits, 432. If I wanted to search all the nearby areas that begin with those three digits-, I could use what is called a wild-card symbol the star, (*) in place of the final two digits and the zipcode would look like this <432* >. The zipcode for Hagen am Teutoburger is 49170 and the zipcode for Georgsmarienhutte is 49124, so if one used the zipcode <491*> as the search location, both towns would be searched. Perhaps even others.

At the Teleauskunft website, after accessing "Das Telefonbuch" page, enter the surname being researched (Tiemann) and then only the zipcode with the three digits and the star (*) symbol (491*), do not enter a city or area code.

This page searches for exact spellings and if you are not sure whether the German spelling will be Tiemann or Tiemann, go one step further. After entering the surname and zipcode as above, click on and at the bottom of the next page, look for the question names also?>, click and then. You may even find a few more relatives nearby.

Federal Land Patent Records

Here is a website that offers a source of information on the initial transfer of land from the Federal Government to individuals. In addition to verifying title transfer the information will allow the genealogist to associate an individual with a specific location and a wealth of additional resources that can be found. The genealogist can also obtain certified copies of land patents. The web site is <www.gloreCORDS.blm.gov>.

After you have found the website, indicate which state you wish to search or you can indicate all states. Then enter the name you wish to search - Patentee Last Name, First Name, Middle Name (optional) hit return. Or you can just insert the last name it will show you everyone with that last name. Set your printer to horizontal, or landscape,

because it is easy to lose some information, especially on the margins, with the portrait setting with 8½ x 11 paper. (Example 1) If a list of names appears make sure you print the list so you have something to compare to later on. When you have found a name that you wish to research, press the DETAIL button for additional information on that individual. (Example 2) The document will show the patentee name, document number, location, date and land office. You may also be able to get a printed detail of the original document. (Example 3). If you have visited the *blm* site in the past you will be amazed with the improvements.

The United States of America,
 TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME, GREETING:

Whereas there has been deposited in the GENERAL LAND OFFICE of the United States a CERTIFICATE of the Register of the Land Office at Marquette, Michigan, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the Act of Congress approved 20th May, 1862, "To cause Homesteads to actual settlers on the public domain," and the acts supplemental thereto, the claim of Joseph Obert has been established and duly recommended in conformity to law for the South half of the North East quarter, the North West quarter of the North East quarter, and the North East quarter of the North West quarter of section twelve, in Township fifty one North of Range thirty-five West of Michigan Meridian in Michigan containing one hundred and sixty acres according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the said Land returned to the GENERAL LAND OFFICE by the SURVEYOR GENERAL.

Now know ye, that there is therefore granted by the UNITED STATES unto the said Joseph Obert the tract of Land above described: TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said tract of Land, with the appurtenances therof, unto the said Joseph Obert and to his heirs and assigns forever

In testimony whereof, I, Theodore Roosevelt President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the Seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

Given under my hand, at the City of Washington, the seventeenth day of March, 1902, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and two, and of the Independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-eighth.

Volunteers conduct up to four hours of limited research on a single question for current members. A modest fee is billed to cover photocopies. Postage and handling there are no hourly research fees.

"Quick Copy Request service is for jobs requiring less than thirty minutes of time. Quick Copy Requests must specify a source and either page numbers to copy or a name or term to check against the index. Requests involving fewer than ten to fifteen pages to be copied usually meet the time limit. Turnaround time on a Quick Copy Request is usually within one to four weeks of receipt of the request.

Our library does not have a full-service Reference Staff to offer immediate replies to reference type questions by telephone or E-mail. However, many questions of this type are appropriate for the "Quick Copy Request." For more information request a copy of the Library Services Request Form & Cover Sheet. 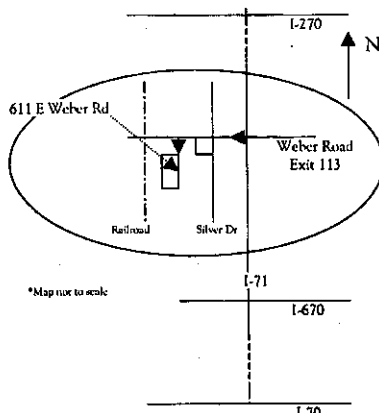
